

PREFATORY NOTE.

In submitting to his kinsmen this little work, the Author is fully conscious of its numerous deficiencies, and regrets that the pressure of other engagements has forced its publication before the attainment of that completeness which had been at first contemplated. He hopes, however, that even in its present form the pamphlet may serve as a stimulus to, and foundation for, further work in the same line, by some member of the Handerson family possessed of more abundant leisure and greater opportunities than he has himself been able to command.

In the system of notation adopted in the following pages, the *generations* are printed at the head of each page, and are also distinguished by Roman characters. The small Arabic numerals above and to the right of each name are the *individual* or *serial* numbers, and serve to identify the individual. Thus, page 67: "Children of Morgan¹⁵⁷ (VI.)" designates the children of Morgan Henderson, who is No. 157 of the sixth generation. By turning to page 44 the history of No. 157 of the sixth generation, Morgan Henderson, will be found. For the ordinary reader, however, the indexes at the back of the book will be more useful than any system of notation. It should be mentioned that on the female side the genealogy has never been carried beyond the third, frequently not beyond the second generation.

In conclusion, the Author desires to return his sincere thanks to all who have aided him in the compilation of the present work, and to bespeak the mantle of charity for the errors and omissions inseparable from labors of a similar character.

THE HANDERSON FAMILY.

The present city of Hartford, Connecticut, was first settled by Mr. John Steel and a few associates from Newtown (now Cambridge), Mass., in 1635. In June of the following year Rev. Thomas Hooker led another party, consisting of about one hundred men, women and children, from Newtown across a pathless wilderness to the seat of the new colony. Among the members of this latter band was Mr. George Steel, likewise a resident of Newtown, and a brother of the Mr. John Steel mentioned above. Both the Steel brothers were immigrants from the county of Essex in England, and both were destined to fill important positions in the new colony thus founded. John Steel was a member of the first court held in Connecticut, April 26, 1636, and one of the deputies to the first General Assembly in 1639. His brother George was also one of the selectmen of Hartford in 1644, and one of the jurors in the same year, and represented the town in the General Assembly almost continuously from 1637 to 1659. brothers died full of years and honors in 1664.

The last will and testament of Mr. George Steel is dated May 24, 1663. The chief part of his estate is bequeathed to his son, James Steel, but among the other legatees are his brother John Steel, his daughter Elizabeth "Wates" (Watts), and his grandchildren James and Mary Steel and Martha Hanison.* This I believe to be the earliest record of the

Handerson (or as here spelled Hanison) family to be found in this country.*

Thomas Watts, the son of Richard Watts of Hartford, and the husband of Elizabeth Steel, whom he had married May 1, 1645,† was also a wealthy and distinguished citizen of Hartford. He was appointed captain of the forces of that town Oct. 14, 1675, and led them to the assault of the Narragansett fortress in December of the same year. His will, bearing date Aug. 6, 1683.‡ leaves the major part of his estate to his wife Elizabeth during her life, and contains also the following clause:

"lt.-1 Give and Bequeath to Martha Hanison & to her & her own proper use, to dispose of as she shall see meet, one parcell of land containing seven acres and a halfe, called by the name of Pesipenck (?), which I give to the said Hannison, to she & her heirs & assigns forever, to come to the injoyment of it one yeare & a day after my wives departure of her naturall life, & also twenty pounds in other of my estate to be payd to her one year & a day after my wives departure of her naturall life."

The inventory attached to the will estimates the value of the entire estate at £1383 2s. 10d., and "74 acres more of land called Pesipanck"—the landed legacy of Martha Hanison are valued at the sum of £60.

Capt. Thomas Watts died childless. His wife Elizabeth followed him to the grave in the next year. Her will dated Feb. 25, 1684, bequeaths the most of her estate to her "loving cousins, Samuel Steel and Samuel Hubbard," but leaves various legacies also to her brother James Steel and his four daughters, Elizabeth Steel, Mary Hall, Sarah Steel and Rachel Steel: to her "little cousins" James Hall and Thomas Steel; to her "cousins" Samuel Hubbard, Samuel Steel and Benony

Brown; to her "sister Willet"; to James Steel's wife; to "cousin Mary's daughter Betty," and to her "little cousin Samuel Hubert." It also contains the following items:

"I Will and Bequeath to my cousin Martha Handerson the bed & bolster & blancket & three sheets that are in the garret chamber, & the rug that is on cousin Steeles bed; also I give her the third bigest platter, & one of the best of the platters that goe about the house, & two of the porrengers that are used about the house, & a quart skillet, & a great skillet without a frame; also I give her my cloath searg suit & my searg coat partially worn (?) & my peneston (?) peticoate & mohayre peticoate and six napkins; also my safe guard & rideing hood when my cousin Betty brings them home." Also

"I Will & Bequeath my wareing lining after that is taken out above disposed of to my cousin Mary Steel, my cousin Samuel Hubbard's wife, my cousin Martha Handerson & my cousin Elizabeth Steel, to be equally divided amongst them."

Who, then, was this Martha Hanison or Handerson remembered so kindly in the wills of George Steel and his son-in-law and daughter? Undoubtedly she was the grand-daughter of George Steel. So much is shown by his will. But who were her parents? This is a subject of great doubt. Hinman says that George Steel had one son James, and two daughters Elizabeth Waite (? Watts) and Mrs. Hanison.* The latter statement is undoubtedly an error, the daughter Mrs. Hanison being assumed in order to account for the grand-daughter Martha Hanison. But we shall see in a few moments that Hanison was the name of Martha's husband, and not her own maiden name. Of course, then, her mother's name was not Mrs. Hanison.

Savage, apparently confounding John and George Steel, gives each of them a wife Rachel, who died in 1653, and sons John and Samuel. The latter were undoubtedly children of John. With reference, however, to George Steel, he adds:

"Will May 24, 1663, gives most of his estate to son James and Elizabeth, wife of Thomas Watts. Perhaps he had another daughter b. 1640, who m. and had daughter Martha, but family genealogy obscure."

As Martha Hanison must have been herself married in 1663, obviously her mother could not have been born in 1640.

Mrs. Watts in her will speaks of "My cousin Martha Handerson," but the term "cousin" is manifestly here used in the general sense of kinswoman. Thus she also speaks of her "little cousin" James Hall (son of her niece), her "cousin" Samuel Hubbard (her husband's nephew), and her "cousins" Samuel Steel (cousin-german) and Benony Brown (husband's niece). No argument can therefore be drawn from her use of this indefinite term.

James Steel, the only son of George, had no child Martha, at least if we may trust the printed genealogies. We are therefore driven to the conclusion that Martha Hanison must have been either the daughter of the "sister Willet" mentioned in Mrs. Watts's will, or of some other child of George Steel, as yet unknown to the genealogists.

But if the question who were the parents of Martha Handerson is obscure, the more important and vital question who was her husband is absolutely unanswerable. No male Hanison or Handerson is mentioned in the list of proprietors of Hartford in 1639, nor in the various lists of the freemen of Connecticut, compiled in 1669, nor in the land or probate records of Hartford from its foundation until the year 1701, nor in any of the lists of births, deaths and marriages in Hartford prior to the same date. In a little pamphlet entitled "Historical Notices of Connecticut, No. 2, by William S. Porter, Member Conn. Hist. Society," published at Hartford in 1842, I find, however, the following notice, page 38, under the heading, "Settlers in Hartford between 1640 and 1700": "James Hannisons or Henderson, S. side."

Now we shall soon see that Martha Handerson had a son James, and whether the extract just quoted refers to this son or to his father of the same name may be open to considerable doubt. However, as the name James is the most common of the Christian names of the Handerson family, it is not unreasonable to conjecture that the earliest of its representatives in this country may have borne this popular name. Constant family tradition asserts that he was a Scotchman, and while I know of no absolutely positive evidence to confirm this tradition, I see no reason whatever to doubt its substantial truth. He was probably a poor man, and not improbably a weaver by

occupation. His poverty may be not unreasonably inferred from the absence of his name in the lists of freemen of Connecticut in 1669, when a personal estate of at least £30 was one of the qualifications requisite for admission to the roll of freemen. That he was a weaver may perhaps be inferred from the fact that this was the trade of his son James, who was likely to follow the occupation of his father. Possibly, too, his poverty and his occupation may have been objections to his marriage with a descendant of the highly respectable Steel family, and their disgust at what they may have considered this mésalliance may aid us in explaining the total absence of the name of Martha Handerson's husband from the various records in which her own name appears. But all this, bear in mind, is pure conjecture.

We come now, however, to firmer ground. From the brown and tattered records of the town of Hartford I extract the following notices:

- "George Wright was married to Mary Hannison, Oct. 18, 1694." *
- "James Hannison was married to Mehetabell Grave, Jan. 1, 1701."
- "Mehetabell Handerson. daughter of James Handerson, was born Novem. 3d, 1710." ;
- " Mehetabell Hannison, daughter of James Hannison & Mabell his w was born Novem. 3d. 1710." \$

- "Gideon Henderson was born August 25, 1713."*

- "James Hannisson was born March 25, 1716." †

Mary Hannison, whose marriage is recorded above, was doubtless a daughter of Martha Handerson. James Hannison, who married Mehetabel Grave, was her son, and the other notices relate to his children. Before passing, however, to the latter, we must close what we have to say with reference to Martha herself. The following deed is quoted in confirmation of the remarks made in the preceding pages, especially with respect to her marriage.

"Land belonging to James Handerson, which he had by gift from his mother."

"To all Christian people to whom these presents shall come: Martha Handerson, of the town of Hartford, in the county of Hartford, in the collony of Connecticott, in New England, in America, widdow, sendeth greeting: Know yee and all men by these presents that I the said Martha Hannison, for and in consideration of a sufficient yearly maintainance and livelyhood to be given allowed and paid to me the said Martha Hannison by my son James Hannison, of the same town of Hartford, weaver, and for the love and affection that I have and bear to my said son, have granted bargained, sold, aliened, released, enfeoffed and confirmed, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell, alien, release and confirm unto the said James Hanison and his hevrs forever, all that my now dwelling house, out houses and home lott, lying and being in Hartford aforesaid, given by Captain Watts, formerly of Hartford, deceased containing by estimation seven acres and one-half, be it more or less, abutting south on an highway, north on land now belonging to Thomas Clark, west on land belonging to Joseph Hopkins and east, part on land of Stephen Hopkins, part on land of Samuel Peck, and part on land of the heyrs of Joseph Peck, dec'd. And also all that my lott of land in the South Meadow in Hartford aforesaid, some time belonging to the said Capt. Watts, containing two acres and an half, be it more or less; abutting north on land of James Steel, Jun'r, east, on land of Paul Peck, south, on land late John Steels, and west on land of Mr. John Haynes; and the reversion or reversions, etc., etc. Nevertheless and provided always that he, the said James Hannison his heyrs and assigns, shall and do yield, render, allow and give unto me the said Martha Hannison at all times during the terme of my naturall life, good and sufficient house roome, maintainance and succours for my suport and subsistance of all things nessesary for my comfortable living. In witness whereof I have hereunto sett my hand and seal in Hartford, this eight day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand and seven hundred and one.

"It is also to be understood that the said James Hannison is to pay all debts now due from his mother, Martha Hannison aforesaid."

"Then appeared Martha Hannison, the subscriber, in Hartford the day and year above written and acknowledged this instrument to be her free and volluntary act and deed.

Coram John Haynes, Jus't. Pacis."

Vera Copia, Entered Feb. 4th, 1703.

This deed establishes beyond the possibility of doubt the facts that the grantor, Martha Hanisson, was the identical person mentioned in the wills of George Steel (1663), Capt. Thomas Watts (1683) and his wife Elizabeth (1684), and that Hanisson or Handerson was not her maiden, but her married, name. Also that she was a widow in 1701, with a son James already arrived at his majority. The latter fact is also corroborated by the record of this son's marriage January 1, 1701.

It is probable that James Handerson was her youngest, if not her only, son, and that soon after his marriage she took up her residence with him, after deeding to him the homestead as a return for his care of her in her old age.

Martha Handerson probably died in 1711. Her son James on Feb. 5, 1711-12, presented to the Probate Court in Hartford the last will and testament of his mother Martha Handerson, but for some unknown reason declined to act as her executor. Probate of the will was therefore adjourned until Sarah Handerson of Farmington, one of the daughters of Martha, could be summoned to court to accept, if so disposed, the position of

administratrix.* Subsequently probate of the will was again postponed, and I find no record either of the will itself or of the fact that it was ever admitted to probate. This is the more to be regretted as this will could scarcely fail to shed some light upon the subject of the relations of Martha Handerson and her family. An inventory of her personal estate was, however, filed in court and may prove of some interest to her female descendants.†

From a careful survey of the facts recorded in the preceding pages we may sum up the history of the first generation of the Handerson family in this country as follows:

The Christian name of its earliest male ancestor is unknown. He was probably a Scotchman and married, at least as early as 1663. Martha, the grand-daughter of George Steel, whose surname is also undetermined. He died before 1701, his wife surviving probably until 1711. They had at least three children: 1. Mary; 2. Sarah; 3. James.

Second Generation.

CHILDREN OF MARTHA (I.)

- 1. MARY², born probably about 1670. Nothing is known of her history further than that she married George Wright in Hartford, Oct. 18, 1694.†
- 2. SARAH³. Of her history nothing is known except that she was living in Farmington, Conn., in 1711-12.§
- 3. JAMES⁴, from whom are descended all the family included in the present genealogy, was born in Hartford, probably about 1675. He married, Jan. 1, 1701, MEHETABEL,

daughter of John GRAVE and Susanna Webster, and the great grand-daughter of John Webster, fifth Governor of the Colony of Connecticut.* In his mother's deed, already quoted, James Handerson is styled a weaver. I find, however, no evidence that he ever followed this occupation. On the contrary, he seems to have been an active business man all his life, and largely interested in real estate. On the death of his father-in-law in 1702, James Handerson was appointed his administrator, † and the land records of Hartford bear ample witness to his activity in the purchase and sale of land in that vicinity. In 1734-35 he purchased several parcels of land in New Hartford, and was one of the original proprietors of land in this town, which was chiefly settled by colonists from Hartford. Tames Handerson died in Hartford in 1745-46, and on March 4, 1746, the Probate Court of Hartford granted to his son James letters of administration upon his father's estate, on condition that he should file his bond for the sum of £500.\S The precise year of the death of Mehetabel Handerson is unknown, but she was living in New Hartford as late as the year 1761. | James and Mehetabel Handerson had at least seven children: 1. Susanna⁵; 2. John⁶; 3. Eliza'; 4. Mehetabel'; 5. Gideon'; 6. James', 7. Martha', and, perhaps, 8. Walter12.

1. SUSANNA⁵. Mr. Boltwood fixes the date of her birth as 1703. Reference to my own eareful copy of the Hartford Records, given on page 10, in which an effort has been made to preserve the precise arrangement of the original, leads me to doubt whether the year 1703 does not apply rather to John

than to Susanna. At all events Susanna was born in Hartford, and of her history nothing further is known.

- 2. JOHN⁶, according to Mr. Boltwood's earlier reading of the records, was born March 20, but the year is uncertain. I rather incline to the opinion that this should be 1703. In Vol. Xl. of the "New York Genealogical and Biographical Record." p. 133, I find the following notice:
- "Records of St. George's Church, Hempstead, Long Island," Marriages: July 17, 1726, at Oyster Bay, L. I., John Handerson and Anne Prime.

From the orthography of the name* and the agreement of the date, with the probabilities of the case, I am of the opinion that this record refers to the John Handerson under consideration. A careful search of the contemporary records of Oyster Bay and Hempstead has, however, thrown no further light upon John Handerson and his descendants.

- 3. ELIZA'. Nothing known further than the record given on page 10.
- 4. MEHETABEL^{*}. Born November 3, 1710. Nothing further known.
- 5. GIDEON⁹ was born in Hartford, Conn., Aug. 25, 1713.† Removing in early life to Northampton. Mass., he here met and married Sarah, daughter of Capt. John Baker‡ of that

town. The family Bible of Gideon Handerson (printed in London by John Baskett, "Printer to the King's Most Excellent Majesty," 1742) and his private papers are now in the hands of his great-grand-daughter Mary Ann, widow of the late Daniel Cowles of Amherst, Mass., and the former contains in the writing of Gideon himself the record of his marriage in the following terms:

"The time when I, Gideon Handerson, was married, in the year 1740, in August, the seventh day, and I was 27 years old the 25th of the same month, and my wife was 27 years old the next October, on ye 26th day of the month."

In 1752 we find Gideon Handerson in Sunderland, Mass., where he purchased, on the 15th day of April, "in the twenty-first year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord, George ye Second. of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King &c.," of Reuben Scott a town lot containing six acres, for which he paid the sum of one pound and one shilling. Subsequently he removed to Amherst, where in 1762 he purchased of Moses Cook a farm of 95 acres, for which he paid 306 pounds, 13 shillings and 4 pence.

This farm was situated upon a gentle elevation of land about one mile north of the present village of Amherst, and commanded a magnificent view toward the west and south, including the heights of Mt. Tom and Mt. Holyoke and the beautiful valley of the Connecticut River. It continued the homestead of the family for just about a century. Gideon Handerson was one of the Revolutionary Committee of Amherst in 1775, and one of the selectmen in 1781. His two sons also served in the patriot army during the war of the Revolution. In 1787 he conveyed the homestead to his son Timothy, on condition that he should maintain his father and mother in comfort during the term of their natural lives, and here he died in a green old age, December 6, 1791. His wife survived until August 25, 1803. They had nine children: 1. Sarah¹³; 2. Sarah²d¹⁴; 3. Gideon 15; 4. Mehetabel 16; 5. Elizabeth 17; 6. Mary 18; 7. Gideon 2d. 19; 8. Timothy 20; 9. Susanna 21.

6. JAMES¹⁰ was born in Hartford, Conn., March 25, 1716.*

He married, Jan. 17, 1741, JERUSHA WHITE of Hartford,* and soon after the death of his father removed in the spring of 1756 to New Hartford, Litchfield Co., Conn., taking with him his mother, Mehetabel Handerson, and his own family. The latter at this period is said to have consisted of his wife, two sons and four daughters. Settling in the vicinity of the present town of Nepaug, where his father had already purchased land as early as 1734, he added to the estate from time to time by purchase until his landed property became very considerable for that day. The records of the town of New Hartford relate that he was "Surveyor of Ways" in 1764, and one of the selectmen of the town in 1767. James Handerson died in New Hartford July 14, 1791. His wife had died Dec. 17, 1785. Of their children only three are known: 1. John²²; 2. James²³; 3. Susanna24.

- 7. MARTHA". On November 3d, 1742-43, James Handerson conveyed to his son James Handerson, Jr., "in consideration of love, good-will & affection which I have and do bear unto my loving and dutifull son," t one acre of land in Hartford, and also the homestead of about twelve acres, reserving, however, the use of the latter to himself and his wife during the term of their natural life. This deed was witnessed by the mark of Martha Handerson, probably a daughter of James Handerson, Sr., but nothing more of her history is known.
- 8. WALTER12. During the second quarter of the 18th century the records of various towns in Connecticut and Massachusetts make mention of a certain Walter Handerson, a man of strongly marked individuality, and whose history, as gleaned from the dry pages of the town records, bears a deep tinge of sad romance. His precise relationship to James Handerson of Hartford is not satisfactorily established. Possibly Walter may have been a son of James, but I am rather inclined to believe him a nephew, the son of some elder brother of

James Handerson, whose name has not vet been discovered. Walter first appears as one of the original proprietors of land in New Hartford, where on Oct. 15, 1734, in conjunction with Robert Bartlett, "both of Hartford," he bought "the hundred and fourty-eighth home lott in number, in quantity five acres and a quarter," for the sum of £21.* In August, 1735, a second survey of fifteen acres of land in New Hartford for "Walter Handerson of Hartford, shopkeeper," is recorded. In 1737 a corporation bearing the attractive title of "The Golden Parlour Mining Company" t was formed in Wallingford, Conn., with the object of developing a gold mine supposed to exist in that town. Of that corporation Walter Handerson was one of the directors. This mine, like so many of ours in the present day, seems, however, to have absorbed more gold than it ever produced, and I suspect it was the cause of the financial reverses which apparently soon after befell our kinsman. In January, 1737, again in partnership with Robert Bartlett, he purchased land in the town of Killingworth, near the present village of Clinton, † and appears to have resided for a short time in Killingworth, for in 1740 "Walter Handerson, late of Killingworth, now of Hartford, trader," conveys to James Possog (Poisson?) of Simsbury "all my lands in the township of Killingworth, in the county of New London, as also all my lands in the township of Worterbury, in New Haven County, & also all my lands in the township of New Hartford, in the county of Hartford, also my land in Stafford and Middletown, in said Hartford county, and in all other townships in the Colony of Connecticut in New England." The consideration of this deed was the sum of £500, and it seems to have been given to protect the interest of the grantor in the financial ruin which he saw impending. Soon after, Walter Handerson removed to the town of Suffield, then in Hampshire Co., Mass., but since 1749 in the county

of Hartford, Conn. The Records of the town of Suffield supply us with the following notices of Walter and his family:*

"WALTER HANDERSON.

Mary Handerson, the dan'r of Walter and Mary Handerson, born May the 14th, 1743—and dec'd July 17, 1743.

William Handerson, the son of Walter and Mary Handerson, born Decem'r the last 1745.

Walter Handerson dec'd Decem'r 6th, 1745."

The concluding notice would lead us to infer that Walter Handerson died in Suffield. But such was not the fact. In the records of the Probate Court of Hampshire Co., Mass., preserved in Northampton, we find under date of June 18, 1746, the petition of Mary, the widow of Walter Handerson, asking to be relieved from the administration of his estate, and presenting the following reasons for her request: "That the said Walter died at Cape Breton and left your petitioner his widow, and his son and only child about 20 months old, under indigent circumstances, his estate insolvent, and 'tis probable will not pay one twentieth part of the debts due from it." She also asks for several articles of the household furniture and signifies her intention of returning to her friends. This petition was granted, and James Poisson of Suffield was appointed administrator of Walter's estate. In September 1747 the administrator asks for nine months more to enable him to complete his inventory, as he finds the said Walter has "traded in divers governments." The request was granted by the court, and the final inventory estimates the estate at the sum of £192 9s. 11d.. with debts amounting to the sum of £8400. Of the debts £150 in

York money was due to the widow of Dr. Henderson of New York *

Between the lines of these dry legal records I think we may read the following history. After the loss of his fortune, about 1740, Walter Handerson withdrew from Hartford to Suffield, but discouraged by his misfortunes, and perhaps harassed by his creditors, in a fit of desperation he enlisted in the New England troops, who participated in the siege and capture of the fortress of Louisburg, June 17, 1745. Probably the command to which Walter belonged was left in garrison on Cape Breton Island, where Walter himself died December 6th of the same year. Of his posthumous son William and his descendants not the slightest information has been attained by the anthor.

Talcott, Albany, 1883 though the latter is said to have been a "merchant." It is also probable that the following advertisement refers to the widow of "Dr. Henderson":

"To be Sold a pleasantly situated Dwelling House and Store House with 15 Acres of good Pasture Land, Orchard and Meadow, convenient for either a Store keeper or Merchant, laying in Mamaronock, on the Boston Road. Whoever inclines to purchase the above Premises may apply to the Widow Henderson or Dr. Alexander Moore, living in New York." (The New York Weekly Post Boy, June 17, 1745. For both these advertisements I am indebted to the Medical Register of the City of New York, Westher this Dr. Ismes Henderson left any descendants and if so, their history.

wood of Amherst. Nothing further is known of her history except that she died April 6, 1783.

- 6. MARY¹⁸, born April 24, 1751; died Oct. 15, 1760 *.
- 7. GIDEON 2d19, born Oct. 9, 1753. He was a private soldier in the company of Capt. Noadiah Leonard, of Amherst, a company attached to the regiment of Col. R. Woodbridge, of the Revolutionary army. A return of Col. Woodbridge's regiment, dated June 14, 1775, shows that this regiment was then stationed at Cambridge, and that Capt. Leonard's company consisted of 54 men. Most of this regiment also participated in the battle of Bunker's Hill, June 17, 1775. the first day of January, 1778, Gideon married Abigail. daughter of Joseph Church tof Amherst, and in the following year removed with his wife to Claremont, New Hampshire, both traveling on horseback through the woods, and Abigail Handerson carrying her infant son Phinehas in her arms. In Claremont Gideon engaged in the business of a tanner and currier, and continued this occupation until his death, July 10, 1825. His wife survived until June 23, 1845. They had two children: 1. Phinehus²⁷; 2. Rufus²⁸.
- 8. TIMOTHY²⁹, born Jan. 18, 1756. He is said to have been a corporal in the company of Capt. Reuben Dickinson of Amherst, a company also attached to the regiment of Col. R. Woodbridge ‡. His pension receipt, however, would seem to indicate that he belonged to the same company with his elder brother, an arrangement which would seem also decidedly the most natural. This pension receipt reads as follows:

WAR DEPARTMENT.—REVOLUTIONARY CLAIM.

I certify that in conformity with the law of the United States of the 7th June, 1832, Timothy Handerson of the State of Massachusetts, who was a corporal and private in the army of the Revolution, is entitled to receive fourty-four dollars and fourteen cents per annum, during his

At the close of the war, Sept. 19, 1781, Timothy married ANNA WALES. He was one of the selectmen of the town of Amherst in 1793, and again continuously from 1802 to 1807. In 1787 he took charge of the old homestead, where he continued to reside until his death, Oct. 14, 1833. In his will, dated May 4, 1827, he gives the homestead to his son Timothy, on condition of his furnishing a comfortable support to his father and mother during the term of their natural lives, and paying to the other children various legacies, ranging from \$100 to \$200. Anna Handerson died at the homestead on April 10, 1829. They had nine children: 1. Ira²⁹; 2. Timothy³⁰; 3. Zebina³¹; 4. Luther³²; 5. Gideon³³; 6. Seth Smith³⁴; 7. Nancy³⁵; 8. Horace³⁶; 9. Harriet³⁷.

9. SUSANNA²¹, born March 15, 1758. Married Moses Cook* of Amherst, and removed to Vermont after 1793, where she died in 1824. Of her history nothing further is known.

He was also one of the selectmen of the town in

H. in 1805 or 1806, where he continued the practice of his profession until 1833. In 1818 he married Hannah Willard, daughter of Rev. Samuel Mead, of Walpole, N. H. Removing to Keene, N. H., in 1833, he continued here the practice of his profession until his death, March 16, 1853. His wife survived until Dec. 29, 1863. He was one of the selectmen of the town of Chesterfield in 1811, represented that town in the General Court in 1812, 1813 and 1815, was State Senator in 1816, 1817, 1823, 1831 and 1832, and at the time of his death was the President of the Cheshire

His wife survived until March 20, 1853. They had five children: 1. Frederick William⁷³; 2. William⁷⁴; 3. Horace Phinehas⁷⁵; 4. Gideou⁷⁶; 5. Lucius Rufus⁷⁷.

- 1. IRA²⁹, born in Amherst, Mass., July 10, 1782. Removing in early life to Claverack, Columbia Co., N. Y., he here married in 1803 ELIZABETH, daughter of Thomas Hopp, of that place. Here he carried on the life of a farmer until the summer of 1833, when with his wife he drove in his own conveyance to the town of Orange, Cuyahoga Co., Ohio, then almost a wilderness, where he purchased a farm. Leaving his conveyance in Ohio, he and his wife returned by steamboat and the Erie Canal to Columbia Co., N. Y., where he spent the winter. In May. 1834, taking his family he retraced his steps to Ohio, reaching Cleveland June 7, 1834. Proceeding at once to his farm in Orange, he continued to reside there until his death, May 12, 1850. His wife died April 24, 1844. Both are buried on a hill upon the old homestead farm. They had five children:

- LUTHER³², born in Amherst, Mass., Aug. 5, 1788. Leaving home early he went to Claremont, Sullivan Co., N. H., where, in company with his consin Rufus, he learned the trade of a tanner and currier. Here he also met and married, Feb. 24, 1818, FANNIE, daughter of Alexander Pickens, of Claremont. Removing thence to Newport in the same county. he carried on his trade here for several years, but about 1830 again removed to Benson, Rutland Co., Vermont, where he erected a saw-mill and grist-mill. Having run these mills for five or six years he removed once more to Poultney, Vermont, then to Grandville, Washington Co., N. Y., thence in 1842 to Mount Morris, Livingston Co., N. Y., where his brother Gideon was then residing. Soon after he removed once more to Rochester, N. Y., but after a residence here of about five years he returned to Pittsfield, Mass., 1860, where he continued to live in the family of his daughter, Mrs. William Pierce. until his death. Sept. 2, 1861. About the year 1836 Luther began to spell his name Henderson, instead of Handerson, as all of his ancestors, so far as known, had done, with the idea that the family name was of Scotch origin and had been originally spelled Henderson. His brother Gideon, convinced by his reasoning and example, adopted the same spelling, as did also his brother Horace at a later period and for a different reason. These three families have since retained the name of Henderson, though all the other descendants of Gideon Handerson, of Amherst, Mass., preserve the ancient and original orthography of Handerson. 5. GIDEON³³, born in Amherst, Mass., Sept. 28, 1790. He also learned the trade of a tanner and shoemaker, but devoted most of his life to farming pursuits. In 1810 he married Dolly Long, by whom he had eight children: 1. Nancy Adeline⁹³; 2. William Long⁹⁸; 3. Dolly Long⁹⁰; 4. Zilpha L. ¹⁰⁰; 5. Elizabeth Dole¹⁰¹; 6. Gideon Wales¹⁰²; 7. De Witt Clinton¹⁰³; 8. Harriet A. ¹⁰⁴

Dolly Handerson died in Sunderland, Mass., May 11, 1829, and soon after Gideon married LOUISA HUBBARD, by whom he had five children: 9. Lauriette Amandu¹⁰⁵; 10. Henry Clay¹⁰⁵; 11. Edward E.¹⁰⁷; 12. Frederick L.¹⁰⁸; 13. Benjamin Frank-lin¹⁰⁹.

About the year 1837 Gideon removed to Mount Morris, Livingston Co., N. Y., thence in 1864 to Mount Morris, Genessee Co., Michigan, and again in 1869 to Milan, Monroe County, Michigan, where he died March 25, 1870. As before mentioned, about 1836, in accordance with the views of his brother Luther, Gideon began to spell his name Henderson, and his family have since retained this orthography throughout all the branches.*

6. SETH SMITH³⁴, born in Amherst, Sept. 6, 1794. While yet a youth (1812) he married LINA FARNHAM, of Sunderland, Mass., by whom he had one child: Zebina¹¹⁰.

Subsequently (about 1816) he married Sarah Hart, of Troy, N. Y., and removing to Newburg, Ohio, prior to 1830, pursued here the practice of his profession as a physician. His activity does not seem, however, to have been confined to strictly professional subjects, for in the fall of 1833 we find him, in conjunction with Noah Graves, laying out the town of Chagrin Falls. Ohio, where he built the first frame house erected in that place, and in 1836 he was sheriff of Cuvahoga

- 7. NANCY³⁵, born in Amherst, January 4, 1797. In March, 1818, she married Ashley Hubbard, a farmer of Sunderland, by whom she had two children: 1. *Harriet Hunderson*¹¹⁴; 2. *Israel Wales*¹¹⁵. She died January 23, 1821.
- S. HORACE³⁶, born in Amherst, Mass., March 1, 1801. Married Oct. 28, 1824, Martha Hubbard, of Sunderland, Mass. After residing for a short time on the old homestead at Amherst they removed to Newport, N. H., where Mrs. Henderson died Oct. 14, 1829, leaving two children: 1, Nancy¹¹⁶; 2, Timothy Hubbard¹¹⁷.

On the death of his wife Horace Henderson removed to Sunderland, Mass., where he married May 23, 1832. CAROLINE Rowe of that town. She died in Amherst. June 14, 1863, her husband surviving until Dec. 14, 1881. By his second wife Horace Henderson had four children: 1. Alpheus Rowe¹¹⁸; 2. Thomas¹¹⁹; 3. Esther¹²⁰; 4. Esther Hubbard¹²¹.

Horace Henderson was a member of the House of Representatives of Massachusetts in 1839–40, a selectman of the town of Sunderland in 1846–7, and a member of the Massachusetts Senate in 1853. In 1855 he removed from Sunderland to Amherst, thence in 1869 to Waltham, Mass., and thence again in 1878 to Everett, Mass., where he died. In his younger days he spelled his name Handerson, like the rest of the family, but subsequent to the change inaugurated by his brother Luther, and in consequence of an error in the spelling of his name in his official papers as postmaster (1850) of Sunderland, Mass., he finally adopted and retained the orthography of Henderson, which has been also retained by his descendants.
