DR GEO. W. PIERCE

Funeral Services and Sketch of his Life.

The funeral of Dr. Geo. W. Pierce was attended at his late residence on West street, last Monday afternoon at two o'clock. The interest and sympathy of the community was attested by the large number of representative men and old residents of the town who were present. The service in every way testified to the esteem and respect in which Dr. Pierce was held by the community. All the resident physicians, and representatives of the profession from other places, were present. □

□ In speaking of Dr. Pierce, Mr. Horton (services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Horton) said, that the loss of the life now ended, would be felt not in the home only, but very widely throughout the whole community. The oak, whose roots extend far in all directions, when uprooted, makes wide ruin and vacancy, so this life had sent out its sympathies so broadly on all sides, that many would mourn its loss. □

□ Dr. Pierce was a lover of books. He delighted in the best things to be found in our literature, and was ever pleased to hold conversation upon these things. It was equally true that he loved nature, and had a wide acquaintance with her ways, a keen appreciation of her beauties and a continued delight in the study of the things about him. But neither his love of books nor his fondness for nature made him less in sympathy with his fellow men. □

□ Mr. Horton spoke also of the Doctor's home life; of the strong affection, which existed between him and his family, and made the very strength and beauty of his life. In no home was there a greater wealth of affection, and at no table and at no fireside was it more pleasant for the guest to be. He was a genial and kindly host, exerting himself for the comfort and enjoyment of all, enlivening by his wit, and instructing by his conversation. Such a life is of great and precious worth in any community. The remarks of Mr. Horton were of special interest, coming from one who could and did speak out of the fullness of his heart. □

□ Dr. George W. Pierce was born at West Boylston, Mass., Oct. 15, 1819, and so was at that time of his death in his sixty-seventh year. He was educated at Leicester Academy, and graduated from the Harvard Medical School in the close of '45. For a short time he practiced his profession in Bolton, but came to Leominster in 1847, where he had since resided. Dr. Pierce was married Dec. 20, 1851, to Miss Damaris Balch of Leominster, a family widely connected in town. Of this marriage four children are now living: Mrs. Edwin Farwell of Hyde Park, Mass., Miss Nellie Pierce, teacher of the 2d grammar grade in the Field High and Grammar School in this town, Mr. George Pierce, in the employ of the Telephone Co., Boston, and Miss Hattie Pierce, teacher in Attleboro, Mass. Three children by this marriage died. Jan. 1, 1869, Dr. Pierce married for his second wife, Mrs. Charlotta A. Carter of Lowell, Mass., who survives him, and by whom he had one child, Master Appleton Pierce, a member of the second class of the High School. □

(IX) Dr. George W. Pierce, son of Levi Pierce (8), was born in West Boylston, Massachusetts, October 15, 1819. He attended the district schools and Leicester Academy. He studied medicine at the Harvard Medical School, from which he was graduated in 1845. Locating for practice first in the quiet little town of Bolton he stayed there two years, then settled in the neighboring town of Leominster in 1847. He practiced there with gratifying success for a period of nearly forty years. He not only won the confidence and esteem of his patients, but of all his fellow-townsmen. He did not confine his attention to his profession, but gave freely of his time and means to the public. He was

particularly interested in public education and for many years was a member of the school committee and trustee of the public library. He was a strong anti-slavery man and in politics was a Republican. He died in Leominster, May 5, 1886.

PITTSFIELD IN 1876

The American House stood, as its successor stands now, on the corner of North Street and Columbus Avenue, then called Railroad Street. The hotel was in those days a structure of wood, with three piazzas and a broad, uncovered platform on the level of the sidewalk. Here our visitor might smoke his cigar al fresco, admire the gyrations of the rubber ball in the hotel fountain, and watch the idlers sitting on the railings of the North Street bridge, which was then unprovided with a fence of boards. If he turned his eyes across the street, he saw a lumberyard and a manufactory of melodeons. He was nearly at the limit of the region of stores. There were no business blocks north

of Summer Street.

William Pierce, 80, for many years a manufacturer of melodeons and a business man of note in Pittsfield, was found dead in his office in Pierce Block on North Street on Sunday evening. Mr. Pierce was in the habit of visiting his office Sunday afternoons to see that everything was all right for the night, but last Sunday he remained away from his home so long that his daughter, Mrs. Packard, became uneasy and going to the office found him upon the floor, dead. Mr. Pierce was a native of West Boylston, but had lived in Pittsfield more than 50 years. He is survived by four children, William Alton of this city, Harvey Cole of Arlington, NJ, Harry G of Radford VA and Mrs. B. A. Packard of this city.

Mr. Pierce's Sudden Death recalls old time industry.

When Melodeons were manufactured in Pittsfield they looked more like kitchen sinks than like musical instruments not pianos and organs of today.

One who remembered Pittsfield of fifty years ago and carefully watched her growth.

The funeral of the late William Pierce was held Thursday at 2 o'clock from his former residence on Union Street, and the large attendance of relatives, neighbors and friends, especially of the elderly people of the city who had known him best in life, was indeed a high testimonial to the esteem in which he had been held. There was a profusion of beautiful floral pieces and cut flowers, the local greenhouses having contributed of their finest and daintiest blooms. The service was conducted by Rev. Gove Griffith Johnson, pastor of the First Baptist church, assisted by Rev. L. A. Palmer, pastor of the Morningside Baptist church. Rev. Mr. Johnson spoke in eulogy of the life of the deceased, prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Palmer, and the entire service was made simple but impressive. Choice selections of the favorite hymns of the deceased were sung by a quartet composed of Mrs. Marshall Wellington, Mr. and Mrs. N. J. Lawton and William M. Prince, and the bearers were William T. Petherbridge, C. C. Gamwell, Myron Hall and Charles Talbot. The interment was in the family plot in the Pittsfield cemetery.

The details of Mr. Pierce's sudden demise are already known to most of our readers, and it remains a comfort to the dear ones left behind to know that the end came peacefully. There was no evidence of suffering. His body lay on the floor of a small room opening out of his office in his North Street business block; heart failure had there overtaken him, and he rested as if asleep. He had evidently been busying himself at some trivial piece of work and had not intended remaining long in his office, for his overcoat and hat were still on.

To review his long and interesting career is to review the advent, development and subsequent abandonment of one of Pittsfield's old-time industries, and industry of 50 years ago. In fact, it was a little more than a half century ago that Mr. William Pierce came to Pittsfield and established an industry now almost forgotten, namely, that of manufacturing melodeons. Odd looking things they would be called today, for the strides of a few decades in this busy world of ours mark many curious changes; but in those days the family that could afford one of them was considered fortunate, indeed, and the people who couldn't afford them were presumed to spend their spare time envying their more thrifty neighbor or looting on the days when they, too, could have music in the house.

And why odd looking? To begin with, the melodeons of those days were not the most elaborate piece of furniture that ever was. As Mr. Pierce expressed it to The Call some years ago, they looked more like old wooden sinks than like musical instruments. The cheaper ones were only four octaves each, and the entire length of the case was only about three and one-half feet, though the instrument sold for \$45 and was really very sweet sounding as instruments run in those

days, but it was not to be doubted that the music executed upon the more elaborate and costly instruments.

Besides these little four-octave melodeons, there were larger and better ones which brought higher prices. The four and one-half octave instruments brought \$55, and those of five octaves sold for \$60. Many of the cases were veneered in rosewood which was brought from the West Indies and sawed into strips at Cohoes, NY whence it found its way to this city. From the manufacture of these simpler instruments the firm naturally branched off into the manufacture of organs, and in this work it developed into one of the best known firms of its kind in this section of the country, and even today their instruments may be found scattered throughout Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York and Pennsylvania, and to knowing to what other ends of the earth may have found their way. How many thousands of instruments were made here, Mr. Pierce said he couldn't tell; but in the states mentioned they were sold in quantities.

For a quarter of a century the business was continued with success, though it has now been nearly a quarter of a century since it was abandoned. In fact, it is one of the old-time industries which, like the drum and gun manufactories, most Pittsfield people have lost sight of and forgotten. A few will remember that the factory used to be in the present Chapel foundry building on Fenn Street, and that the ware rooms used to be on North Street where Central Block now stands, and there may be a few who will remember that the firm name was first Cox & Pierce and afterwards Pierce & Cutting. Amasa S. Cox was the business partner of Mr. Pierce, and the latter stated he believed it was largely through him that the firm happened to locate in Pittsfield. He looked over the territory carefully, saw that it was then thrifty, that its manufacturing industries were meeting with success and that there were springing up hundreds of homes throughout this section of the state, and, as there was no other firm of the kind in the locality, it was deemed a good place to establish in business. After one and one half years, Mr. Cox was succeeded in the firm by Leonard M. Cutting, and the firm became Pierce & Cutting. A little later, Mr. Cutting died with hemorrhage.

Mr. Pierce then continued in business alone, and would probably have remained in it even until later years had it not been for the fact that a competitor came into the field and manufactured an instrument which Mr. Pierce saw was the equal of his own make, but which was sold in the market for less than it actually cost to manufacture. He foresaw the end and so changed his tactics, gave up the manufacture and commenced to buy and sell instruments of other makes. His competitor was the Wood organ and that firm failed.

From the making of those little, old, sinklike melodeons there have been great strides in the industry, and to compare the elaborate and highly polished and costly organs of the present day with the sawed-off affairs of a half-century ago, would reveal no resemblance, except for one. Each would be found to have keys and each would have pedals, but with pedals and keys would end all comparisons. The organs of today are handsome pieces of furniture, and a small fortune may be packed away in the fine piano finish of the modern instrument which is in reality based on the principles of the little four-octave affair of 50 years ago.

Mr. Pierce was a native of West Boylston and nearly 80 years of age when he died, and yet even during the last days of his life he retained his faculties to a remarkable degree and walked our streets as firm and erect as many men of 50. He had watched Pittsfield grow from a place of about 6,000 inhabitants to a city of nearly four times that number; the Dr. Todd church is now used for a dance hall, and is replaced by a structure of stone; the few business streets of handsome and pretentious structures; churches and schools have sprung up and scores of streets have been laid out and lined on either side by nice homes.

One of the most remarkable changes, which he witnessed, is the change in the values of real estate. When Mr. Pierce bought the present Colt property at the corner of North and Union streets he paid only \$9,000 for it, but it was only a few years ago that he sold a little less than one-half of his purchase for \$15,000. Today it is held at considerably more. Across the way, at the corner of Melville and North streets, Mr. Pierce could have bought the whole corner for \$1,800. Today, all of our readers know that it can hardly be bought for any price. It was in 1855 that he erected the Pierce block in which occurred his death. When it was first put up it was considered as almost out of town (just South of the present YMCA), but now, so great has been the city's growth, it is in the

heart of the business center. The block was enlarged by him about 10 years ago. He was the proprietor of two double tenement houses on Union Street and of 36 acres of land adjoining the Elmwood property, which has recently been improved and is considering one of the most desirable tracts of land in the real estate market of Central Berkshire.

Politically, he was in his younger days a Whig. He had been a Republican since the formation of that party, but had never cared to hold public offices.

On December 25, 1844, Mr. Pierce was united in marriage with Elizabeth Henderson, of West Boylston, daughter of Luther Henderson. She became the mother of seven children, four of whom are still living, William Alton and Mrs. B. A. Packard of this city, Harvey C. of Arlington NJ, and Harry G. of Radford VA. Two sisters, Mrs. J(ane) P. Newton of this city and Mrs. A. M. Wilcox of Uxbridge and two brothers, L. M. Pierce of Springfield and Edward Pierce of West Boylston, survive.

Sketch of his life - Facts about his Death.

William Pierce of 37 Union Street and owner of the Pierce block was found dead in his building on North Street Sunday night at 11 o'clock by his son-in-law and his daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Bertrand S. Packard. He had been dead several hours when found.

Mrs. Bertrand A. Packard, daughter of Mr. Pierce, with whom she lived at 37 Union Street said this afternoon:

"My father had not been in good health for some time. He had neuralgia and had been unable to sleep much at a time. For the past three or four days he had been much better and at the dinner table Sunday my husband remarked how well father was looking.

"Sunday afternoon about 4:30 o'clock he left the house to go to the block on North street where he had an office and where he kept a fire in that room. As he did not return I went to the block to look for him at about 9 o'clock. I found the door locked. I went out and around the block to ascertain if there was a light there and found none.

"When my husband came home I told him of father's absence. He went to my brother's and then to the block and forced the door of the office.

"In a room opening out of the office was father. He was dead. He was fully dressed and had his overcoat and hat on. A hammer lay near him. He had evidently been at work fixing a window when death occurred. The drafts had been opened in the stove and there was no light burning. He must have died early in the afternoon, soon after he had arrived at the block."

Assistant Medical Examiner Colt viewed the body and gave permission for its removal to 37 Union street. Heart disease was the cause of death.

Mr. Pierce was 80 years old. He was born in West Boylston, Mass., June 26, 1821 (??). He learned the cabinet making trade in Worcester and in 1850 came to this city and started in the melodeon and organ making business. He formed co-partnership with his cousin, a Mr. Cutting, and for a long time the firm name was Pierce and Cutting. Later Mr. Pierce opened a piano and organ sales room in the Pierce block which he had built and until Wood Bros. opened business here it was the only music store in this city. Some years ago Mr. Pierce went out of business but has always maintained an office in his block.

He married Miss Elizabeth Henderson of West Boylston in 1844. The surviving children of the union are William A. of this city, H.C. of Arlington NJ, Harry G. of Radford, VA. and Mrs. B.A. Packard of Pittsfield. Two brothers Levi M. of Springfield, Edward of West Boylston and 3 sisters,

William Pierce, tuneful manufacturer

GREAT BARRINGTON

Melodeons were popular musical instruments from the 1840s to the late 19th century, among other reasons because of their portability. One foot pedal forced air across brass keyboards to produce sounds. Another pedal controlled volume. Small melodeons had limited keyboards.

If you have a melodeon made by William Pierce of Pittsfield, you have a collector's item. The Smithsonian Institution has one, or at least it did in 1910, when the annual report for the U.S. National Museum listed "a melodeon made in Pittsfield, Massachusetts, by William Pierce, principal to 1863, formerly the property of Dr. Theodore F. Hance and contributed by his estate."

--==--

Pierce (1836-1901) was born in West Boylston, near Worcester. He and his wife, Elizabeth Henderson (1820-1897), raised a family of seven. Pierce wanted to start a business, and scouted likely locations.

"He looked over the territory carefully, saw that it was then thrifty, that its manufacturing industries were meeting with success and that there were springing up hundreds of homes throughout this section of the state, and, as there was no other firm of the kind in the locality, it was deemed a good place to establish its business," The Sunday Morning Call said in a Pierce obituary on Feb. 3, 1901. They moved to Pittsfield in 1849.

Pierce partnered with Amasa S. Cox in the manufacture of organs and melodeons. After a year and a half, the pair went their own ways. Cox continued his business in Worcester. Pierce found a new partner in Pittsfield, Leonard M. Cutting. They had a shop on Fenn Street. Cutting soon went his own way, too. He died. The business eventually relocated to North Street.

Son William A. Pierce (1848-1925) when he was old enough joined the company, by then located at 114 North St, at the Central Block, according to an 1859 city directory. It was at 142 North St. from 1873 on, according to later directories. The senior Pierce lived at 153 North St., at the corner of Union. He built the Pierce block in 1855 and enlarged it in 1878. Pierce owned two apartment buildings on Union Street and 36 acres of land near Elmwood.

The senior Pierce in 1899 told The Morning Call his melodeons "looked very much like a small wooden sink." The newspaper explained, "The melodeons of those days were not the most elaborate piece of furniture that ever was... The cheaper ones were only 'four octaves' each, and the entire length of the case was only about three and one half feet, though the instrument sold for \$45 and was really very sweet sounding as instruments run in those days, but it is not to be doubted that the music executed upon them was even more enjoyed in the homes thro'-out the country than is much of the so-called music executed today upon the more elaborate and costly instruments."

These musical instruments are akin to, but should not be confused with, Irish or Cajun melodeons, which are almost accordions. The difference is, a handheld melodeon plays different notes as the bellows is pushed in and pulled out. It has buttons but no keyboard. It's something like a harmonica. An accordion plays a sustained note no matter the direction of the bellows. The melodeon is non-chromatic. Most portable melodeons have two keys available (G and D), some have three (G, D and A), to provide a simple bass accompaniment.

Some pedal-pumped melodeons were elaborate pieces of furniture and looked like pianos. In fact they were predecessors to pedal pump organs. In Europe, harmoniums are virtually the same as melodeons.

Pierce's shop turned out 100 melodeons a year. Melodeons did come in larger sizes; a four-and-a-half octave instrument cost \$55, a five-octave was \$60. "Many of the cases were veneered in

rosewood which was brought from the West Indies and sawed into strips at Cohoes, N.Y.," The Call said, "whence it found its way to this city. From the manufacture of these simpler instruments the firm naturally branched off into the manufacture of organs, and in this work it developed into one of the best known firms of its kind in this section of the country, and even today their instruments may be found scattered throughout Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York and Pennsylvania ... How many thousands of instruments were made here, Mr. Pierce said he couldn't tell; but in the states mentioned they were sold in quantities."

Pierce also made out on real estate. He purchased the former Colt property at the corner of North and Union for \$9,000, and not long before his death, he sold half that property for \$15,000.

When he put up the Pierce block, the Call said, "it was considered as almost out of town, but now, so great has been the city's growth, it is in the heart of the business center. The block was enlarged by him about 10 years ago. He was the proprietor of two double tenement houses on Union street and of 36 acres of land adjoining the Elmwood property." When another manufacturer in Pittsfield began to undercut Pierce's prices, he quit the manufacturing and went strictly into retail. The senior Pierce retired in 1885. The younger Pierce eventually relocated to Baltimore.

Sudden Death of William Pierce

William Pierce, 79, for many years a melodeon and organ builder, died suddenly from heart failure late Sunday night in his office in the Pierce block on North Street. He had but recently recovered from a severe and extended illness and was able to be out a few hours each day. Sunday afternoon he left his home on Union Street to go to his block and attend to the stoves, and not returning, a search was made. His daughter, Mrs Bert A. Packard, and her husband went to his office and found the door locked, and the latter burst in the panels. The room was intensely hot and in a small apartment, just off from it, Mr Pierce was found lying on the floor, dead. The body was viewed by Assistant Medical Examiner Colt and later taken to the home of the deceased. Mr Pierce was born in West Boylston, June 26, 1821, and learned the cabinet-making trade in Worcester. He went to Pittsfield in 1850 and began the melodeon and organ making business, forming a partnership with his cousin (actually brother-in-law) a Mr. Cutting, under the firm name of Pierce & Cutting. A piano and organ store was later opened in the Pierce Block by Mr Pierce and his son William, and was conducted by them until 1885. Mr Pierce then retired from the business, but had an office since in the block for collecting of rents. He married Miss Elizabeth Henderson of West Boylston in 1844 (Mr Cutting married her sister Susanna Henderson), and these children survive: William Alton Pierce and Mrs Bert A. Packard (Ellen Elizabeth Pierce) of Pittsfield. Harry G. of Radford VA, and Harvey Cole of Arlington NJ. He also leaves two brothers, Levi Merriam of this city (Springfield), Edward of West Boylston, and three sisters, Mrs Jane Pierce Newton of Pittsfield, Mrs George Parks of Worcester and Mrs A. Wilcox of Uxbridge. The funeral arrangements have not been made.

DEAD IN HIS OFFICE

GRIM MESSENGER OVERTOOK AGED WILLIAM PIERCE

While He Was In His Block Caring for the Fires

Jan 28, 1901

From Monday's Eagle. (not sure which paper this clipping is from)

William Pierce of 37 Union Street, senior member of William Pierce and Son, was found dead in his office in the Pierce Block, upper North Street, early last night. (located on the site of the YMCA addition)

As was his custom on Sundays he left his home about 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon to go to the block and look after his fires. He has often been gone for 2 hours of a Sunday afternoon and that he stayed for that length of time yesterday caused no special anxiety at his home. However as darkness began to deepen, his daughter, Mrs. B. A. Packard, who lives in the same house on Union Street, determined to go to the office and ascertain the reason of Mr. Pierce's long absence.

She went there and found the door locked. She went around to the rear to see if there was any light visible in the shop, but there was none. Mrs. Packard then surmised that her father must have gone to Dalton to call on friends as he does frequently. This thought sufficed to ease her mind for a time.

Mr. Packard returned from his duties in Manning's drug store at his usual hour and to him she communicated the fact that Mr. Pierce was absent for some unknown reason. Mr. and Mrs. Packard went to the block, and finding the door still locked, determined to burst in the portal, and this was done. The room was intensely hot. Passing through this apartment a smaller room in the rear was reached. Mr. Pierce lay on the floor dead. He had not removed his overcoat and hat. It is the belief that on entering the first room he turned on the draft of the stove and then passed on to the adjoining apartment to finish up some work which he had been doing there. He had just picked up a hammer when death overtook him. Heart failure was given as the cause of death.

Had Mr. Pierce lived he would have been 80 years of age on July 26. He was born in West Boylston and went to Worcester when a comparatively young man to learn the trade of cabinet making. He soon became an expert in the business. Mr. Pierce came to Pittsfield about 52 years ago (1849) and has since lived here, carrying on the business of making melodians and organs. Since living here he has been very successful and has accumulated a considerable property. In 1844 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Henderson of West Boylston and she died about four years ago. Seven children were born to them, of whom four survive - William A(ton) of this city, Harvey C(ole) of Arlington NJ, Harry G. of Radford VA, and Mrs. Bertha A. Packard (Ellen Elizabeth Pierce) of this city. Arrangements for the funeral cannot be made until word is received from the out of town relatives. Harvey C. Pierce of Arlington is confined to his home by the grip and there is a possibility that he cannot come on to attend the funeral.

Although the deceased was well advanced in years, he carried his age finely and was thought well of by everybody. His disposition was kindly and he had a host of friends. He was not a member of any local organizations.

His health for some time past has not been of the best although of late he seemed greatly improved. Dr. Woodruff was his physician.

From Life with the 49th:

Allen M. Dewey, Corporal in Company C, died at New Orleans, on March 23rd 1863. He was taken sick just as we left Carrollton, and lingered with fever for six weeks. His sufferings were borne with gentle patience. I saw him lying on his one blanket, emaciated, the bones working

through the skin, which was raw and marked with putrid sores, gasping for breath, yet seemingly resigned. When we made a feint on Port Hudson, many of the sick were removed to New Orleans. He was one of that number. I fear it hastened his death. One of his comrades says he died with all the calmness of him whose peace with God was made. He was from Pittsfield, aged thirty-five years, a melodeon-maker by trade. He was a faithful soldier and a genial companion. We shall miss his pleasant smile and that rich voice which he so often cheered us with its melodious song. Heaven's choir has received him, and his war has terminated in a hallowed peace.

To Start Work Soon on New Building - Joyce Block and Pierce Block Tenants Notified to Vacate Pittsfield, April 28 - The Young Men's Christian Association today ordered the tenants of the Joyce block south of its home building to vacate by June 1 and Walter F Hawkins, trustee of the syndicate owning the Pierce block just south, ordered its tenants to move out at the same time. This means that work will be started at once on the monitor building to which Judge Charles L. Hibbard referred in his annual report as president of the association last night. The new owners of the Joyce block are friendly to the association which will have a chance to take over all the property when in the future its needs and finances warrant.

With the demolition of the Joyce and Pierce blocks the last of the old wooden buildings on the east side of the business section of North St will disappear. The Pierce block was built in 1855 by the late William Pierce who came here from Worcester in 1850 and established a melodeon manufacturing shop in the Burbank block where the Peirson Hardware company is now. He built his block for the rapidly increasing business and at the maximum employed about 20 hands. Mr. Pierce established a national reputation for his melodeons. After the Civil War he built organs there and continued in business until 1890. Mr Pierce was the father of William Alton Pierce of 232 First Street, coal merchant. The new Monitor block will have a North street frontage of 75 feet.

The death of Mrs. Elizabeth Henderson Pierce took place late Friday afternoon at her home on Union Street, Pittsfield, MA and the funeral will be held from the house Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, Rev. She lived there but a short time and after a residence in one or more places she moved to Pittsfield 47 years ago, and since that time has resided here. She was married to William Pierce at Worcester in 1844 and two years ago they celebrated their golden wedding. The deceased is survived by her husband who for many years was in the piano and organ business in this city, three sons William Alton Pierce of this city, Harvey Cole Pierce of Arlington, NJ, and Harry G. of Radford, VA, and one daughter, Mrs. Bertrand A. Packard (Ellen Elizabeth Pierce) of this city. One sister, Mrs. H.M. Beaty of Jerseyville, IL, and two brothers, Daniel Henderson of Waco Nebraska and George W. Henderson of Rochester, NY, also survive her. Mrs. Pierce has been an invalid for a number of years but the last two years has been practically helpless. Death however was rather sudden and unexpected, resulting from a two days' attack of pneumonia. She sold this business about 18 years ago and has since resided with her daughter, Mrs. W.J. Oatman. About eight years ago she suffered a (shock) stroke of paralysis and has since been in feeble health. She united with the First Baptist church soon after taking up her residence in Pittsfield and was an active worker in the various ladies societies connected with the church. Her husband died many years ago. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. W.J. Oatman and Mrs. E.H. Kirby of this city and an aged sister Mrs. Adella P(ierce) Wilcox of Uxbridge, Mass.

The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at 2:30 from her late home (the Oatman home) on North Street and Rev. C.P. MacGregor of the First Baptist church will officiate. Burial will be in the Newton family plot in the Pittsfield cemetery.

Notes for William Foster Pierce:

William Foster Peirce born at Chicopee Falls Massachusetts February 3, 1868. At the Springfield high school he was prepared for college entering Amherst at the early age of sixteen. Although he took the classical course he was greatly interested in natural science and until his senior year he expected to become a practical chemist. For two summers during his course he attended the Amherst Summer School doing laboratory work in science. But in his senior year he elected the study of philosophy with Professor Garman and he discovered a decided taste for philosophy and determined to make the teaching of philosophy his profession. At Amherst he had the honor to be elected to the Senior Scientific Society and to the Phi Beta Kappa Society and these elections well indicate his all around scholarship. Being graduated in 1888 he spent a year in business with his father in which he gained a practical knowledge of bookkeeping and much valuable experience. In 1889 he entered for a year the Graduate School of Cornell University for the study of philosophy and economics. His thesis for the degree of MA was presented to his alma mater instead of to Cornell. It was a masterly production on the Methods of Inducing Introspective Power one Aspect of the Pedagogics of Psychology. It has since been published as a monograph by the Ohio University. After the course at Cornell Professor Peirce taught in a boys boarding school in northern Massachusetts. In January 1892 he came to the Ohio University at Athens as substitute for the professor of psychology and pedagogy. His work there was so acceptable that the chair of philosophy and ethics was created for him and he was elected to it. But at the same time he was considering the chair of history and economics in the University of Colorado and the Spencer and Wolfe Professorships of Mental and Moral Philosophy at Kenyon. Although of the three positions the one at Kenyon was much the least attractive financially the high reputation of Kenyon in the east and the fact that it was the college of his church determined him to come to Gambier. He has steadily grown in the esteem of his colleagues and

acquaintances. With unusual mental strength and attainments he unites unusual loveliness of character and grace of manner. A profound scholar he is a man of the times awake to present day interests In the spring of 1893 he wrote for the University Magazine of New York some elaborate articles on the college which were published with handsome illustrations. Since 1896 he has served as president of Kenyon College. His ideals for the college are high and his interest in all the departments of the institution is intense He appreciates the purpose and opportunity of Bexley Hall having himself been ordained to the diaconate in June 1894 and later to the priesthood In June 1896. President Peirce received the degree of LHD from Hobart College in 1908 he received the degree of DD from Western Reserve. He has served as president of the Ohio Association of College Presidents and Deans and is now 1909 vice president of the Ohio Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. He is a member of the County Teachers Association and of the State Teachers Association also of the Society for Psychological and Pedagogical Inquiry whose membership is limited to twenty five specialists and is serving in the capacity of secretary and treasurer. President Peirce married June 18, 1891 Louise Fagan of Hackettstown New Jersey the marriage being the outcome of an acquaintance and attachment formed in the Graduate School at Cornell. At the age of eighteen Miss Fagan was graduated from Vassar College. After a year of graduate work at Vassar in philosophy and English she went to Cornell at the same time as Professor Peirce for further work on these lines.

Notes for Louise Stephens Fagan:

Louise Pierce would have been hard pressed to call her years at Kenyon enjoyable. She and President Pierce were married for 46 years, from 1891 until their divorce on March 27, 1937. The lackluster marriage, however, made situations difficult for both of them. Louise Pierce filed for divorce in 1934. Christopher Barth's Honors History Thesis, Seeking the Kenyon Ideal: The Modernization of Kenyon College Under the Administration of William Foster Pierce 1896-1937, states that Louise felt that "President Pierce maintained toward [her] a 'fault-finding and contentious state of mind,' and that he treated her with studied insolence and disrespect." In late 1936 until early 1937, Louise took a trip around the world funded by President Pierce, who gave her \$4000 in an effort to get her off campus and diminish the scandal surrounding the divorce. However when she returned she found herself locked out of Cromwell Cottage. Consequently for the last month before the divorce was finalized, Louise stayed with the Parkers, a family in Gambier. Mr. Parker was employed by the college as a clerk for the science store and Mrs. Parker held various jobs on campus, including working in the home of Dr. and Mrs. Pierce. While Louise was there, she tutored their daughter, Jane Parker May, in Latin, but according to Jane, "Louise was helpless because all she knew was academia". After the divorce was finalized Louise went to Ithaca, New York where she worked as a librarian at the Cornell library.

It is said that theirs was a marriage of convenience. The question is, convenient for whom? Perhaps the answer is Kenyon College itself. Due to President Pierce's lack of devotion to Louise, he plunged himself into his work. Kenyon benefited from his dedication, which propelled the college into the twentieth century. On the other hand, Louise was neglected. The couple entertained frequently but that did not bring them any closer. In fact, it probably served to keep them apart. It is easier to appear happy than to actually be so. President Pierce's disregard for Louise was only one factor; she was also bored. Louise was an educated woman; like President Pierce himself, she had graduated from Cornell University. Pierce even notes her helpfulness, admitting that she had coached him in classics and languages, as well as on how to write speeches properly. However, Kenyon simply did not offer Louise the opportunities to tap into her intellectual abilities or interests. She did have a job as a librarian, helping to catalogue the library holdings to make it more useful, but that job proved not to be stimulating enough for her. She did write a book while she was here, called *The Guide for the Blind*, that was published in April 1909. That appears to be the extent of her writing career as well as her academic career. She also was not considered very sociable, which perhaps explains why she was not happy at Kenyon. There were rumors that their marriage was never consummated, though some believed that that she had started these rumors out of spite, due to the President's lack of attention and her sheer boredom.

President Pierce was on the faculty at Kenyon from 1892 until 1938. He was a professor of mental and moral philosophy and instructor in history and economics here for four years until he became president in 1896. He was elected to the presidency in 1896 after the board had been turned down by Professor Flavel S.

Luther of Trinity College. Probably one of the youngest college presidents of his time, the 28 year old Peirce had shown himself to be an able teacher and his election met with great student support. He was president for 41 years, followed by a year of sabbatical after which he returned to Gambier with his second wife, Edith Calvert Bruce, a direct descendent of Lord Baltimore, for his retirement. After he left Kenyon, he returned only once more for a as well as many letters from his mistress. Yet there are only three pictures of his wife. This is a rather strange phenomenon. Despite his rocky marriage, President Pierce's legacy is firmly established. He not only kept Kenyon afloat, but launched it into the twentieth century. The same could not be said of Louise. She appears to have thrived on anonymity. Her legacy is one of obscurity, which entices people to be inquisitive and pry right into a wall of unknowns.

William Alton Pierce, aged 76 years, died last evening in the home of his daughter Mrs. A. W. Irwin (Mabel Elizabeth Pierce) of Baltimore, MD. where he has been for the last two months. Mr. Pierce suffered a shock three weeks ago today and his death came as a result of it. Mr. Pierce was born in Leominster, MA, September 2, 1848, and has lived all his life in this city (Pittsfield) since his family moved here when he was two years of age. On Wednesday morning, when the sad news of the death of William Alton Pierce was received in this city, there was a feeling of profound sadness among his large circle of old friends and acquaintances of over 70 years duration. Mr. Pierce, as has been stated, died in the home of his eldest daughter in Baltimore, MD on Tuesday evening (6/2/25)

He was the son of the late William and Elizabeth Henderson Pierce, and while not born in Pittsfield he had lived here nearly 75 years. He was the eldest of seven children, was educated in the public schools of the old town of Pittsfield and, early in life, became associated with his father in the business. The elder Mr. Pierce was the pioneer manufacturer of melodeons here and in the early (18)60's established a large music house, taking over the agency of the leading pianos, organs and other musical instruments of the time.

It was in this business that the subject of this sketch became interested as a partner and the firm became known throughout western Massachusetts as William Pierce & Son. To this firm Mr. Pierce brought the energy of young manhood and a large business was built up. He continued the business with his father until the later retired from active pursuits and then Mr. Pierce sold out and gave his attention for some years to the dairying business. At one time his herd of high-bred milch cows was greatly admired by lovers of such cattle, and visitors came from afar to inspect them.

About 20 years ago he bought the coal business of the late Charles D. Beebe. Mr. Beebe died before Mr. Pierce could be made acquainted with the management of a business of that kind, but he went to work with a will and, by giving his entire time and energy to his new enterprise, he succeeded. At one time he was credited with handling the largest tonnage of coal in the city. Being a man of his word and having the reputation of being scrupulously honest and never making a promise he did not fulfil, the business developed beyond expectations. It was his honorable dealings that endeared him to such a large business circle. He retired from the business some time since and the enterprise has been carried on under the name of the Pierce Coal Company.

Early in his young manhood he became a tireless church worker, and later in life when the Morningside Baptist church was organized, became one of its charter members, giving bountifully of his means and serviced at all times. He served with credit on the finance committee of the church and his judgment was of great value during the building of the present edifice. For many years his wife, while health and strength was given her, was one of the most active women workers in the church, serving for many years prior to her death as president of the Ladies' Aid society and was an officer in the societies connected with the church.

Mr Pierce was a very companionable man and his loyalty to his friends was generally remarked. A great lover of out-door sports and athletics, he early became one of the best players on the Old Elm baseball club of a half century ago. He held membership in the Crescent lodge of Masons, Pittsfield lodge of Elks and in the Park club. In all of the different organizations to which he belonged he was very popular and was among the first to offer his services and aid in other ways when substantial aid was needed. During the shortage of coal in years gone by his big heart was greatly touched by the appeals that poured in on him and late at night and early in the morning he delivered with his own hands coal - to needy families and where sickness had entered the home - in such quantities as he could spare. Those who remember Mr. Pierce are a unit in proclaiming his business integrity and gentlemanly bearing at all times. The sympathy of Pittsfield goes out to his two daughters and the son who survive.

The services at the grave this afternoon were in charge of the Crescent lodge of Masons, of which he was a member for many years. It can truly be said that in the passing of Mr. Pierce Pittsfield has lost one of its most substantial friends.

Alton Pierce Drowned
While skating on Silver Lake today.
All efforts to resuscitate him proved to be in vain.
The first drowning accident of the winter in this city occurred at Silver Lake this morning. Alton R. Pierce breaking through the ice about 40 feet from the west shore. His body was in the water fully three-quarters of an hour before recovered but efforts were made for nearly four hours to resuscitate him but all efforts were fruitless. The body was recovered shortly after 9:30 o'clock and it was not until after the arrival of Medical Examiner Brown of North Adams at 1:15 o'clock that the work was given up.

The skating on Silver Lake has been excellent the last few days although the ice has been none too strong. Crowds of young people anxious to make the best of the sport before snow falls have been taking advantage of it. This morning the light fall of snow rather spoiled the sport but nevertheless the lake furnished amusement for a large number of young people. Among the number was Pierce who had come home for a vacation of two weeks. He arrived on the lake early and being an excellent skater was soon enjoying the fun. He had a hockey stick in his hand and had been driving a block across the pond.

Near the west shore of the lake, a short distance from the Silver Lake mill, the lake is always open because of the large quantity of hot water which flows from the mill. The ice which forms in that vicinity is always light and it was here that Pierce skated. It was not until today that ice had formed there and it being covered with snow the young man had no means of knowing he was skating in a very dangerous place. People who were near by heard a shout and saw Pierce go through the ice. The young man is an excellent swimmer and tried hard to save himself and it is

claimed was holding to the ice when a man drove by and refused to assist him, although the young man was crying for help. Several of the boys who were on the lake saw Pierce go down and rushed to the mill nearby and notified some men of what had happened. By that time Pierce had become exhausted and being unable to hold to the ice, went to the bottom.

The police were notified and Officers Thompson and White soon arrived with grappling irons. After a short search the body was recovered and immediately taken to the house of Mrs. Ann E. Foster near the edge of the lake. Mrs. Foster's son, Dr. Foster of New York, who is visiting his mother, was at home and lost no time in starting to work on the unconscious young man. With the assistance of several men efforts were made to resuscitate Pierce and work continued until the arrival of the medical examiner. Drs. Waite, Mercer and Adams were also present. The body was later removed to the home of the parents on First Street.

Alton R. Pierce was a son of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Pierce and a grandson of William Pierce, who was for a number of years in the piano business in Pittsfield. The young man was born here May 1, 1876 and received his education in the public schools, being a member of the class of 1894 at the high school when he gave up his studies and entered the office of the Sunday Morning Call. He was placed at work on the Thorne typesetting machine and soon became an adept at this work. He was later given a position in the works of the Thorne typesetting machine company and got a practical knowledge of the work. About two years ago he took a position in Richmond Virginia having charge of several of these machines. He remained there until last summer when he returned home and spent several months with his parents. During the fall he was proffered a position in a collar works at Arlington NJ where his uncle (Knowlton Francis Pierce) was superintendent, and he accepted. He remained there until last Saturday when he came home for a vacation of two weeks. The young man was an excellent skater and swimmer and was undoubtedly overcome with the cold before going to the bottom. About four years ago while in bathing at Pontoosuc lake he had a narrow escape from drowning, being stricken with cramps when out quite a distance from shore. Fortunately some companions were near by and swam to his assistance.

The deceased is survived by his parents, one brother and a sister. No funeral arrangements have yet been made.

Death of H. C. Pierce

After a long illness the end came with a shock - his career.

The funeral of Harvey Cole Pierce, who died suddenly on Monday morning, took place Wednesday afternoon from his late residence, No. 27 Stuyvesant Avenue. It was very largely attended, among those present being many public officials and the older residents of the town. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. J. F. Schindell, and the interment was made in Arlington Cemetery. John D. Crane had charge of the funeral arrangements. The pallbearers were I. V. Dorland, E. G. Ljungholm, John A. Gilmore, G. H. Powell, Dr. P. W. Barber, Joseph Parker, Jr., H. Frapwell, Dr. J. A. Exton and J. B. Thomson, all past masters of the Triune Lodge, F. & A. M. The Arlington Company factories were shut down half a day and every employee attended the funeral.

Mr. Pierce came to Arlington in 1892 to succeed Mr. Cooper as superintendent of the Arlington Company. The concern was a small and inconsequential affair at that time, and Mr. Pierce at once set to work to build it up. It is a big plant today, one of the very largest in the world, and no little of its success is due to his efforts. The tremendous strain, however, undermined his health, and resulted in a nervous disorder from which he appeared unable to rally, and at the end a stroke of apoplexy carried him off.

Harvey Pierce was easily one of the most popular men in town, and his sterling integrity, thoughtful consideration and kind-heartedness won him a position here that will not soon be replaced. At one time he was a member of the Board of Education, and at another time he was a member of the Board of Health. He was born in Pittsfield, Mass. in 1860, and for a number of years resided in

THE AMERICAN ZYLONITE COMPANY OF ADAMS, MA 1881-1991

The American Zylonite Company was formed in 1881 to manufacture cellulose nitrate plastic products under a license from the British company, the Xylonite Company. Despite the difference in initial letters, the two names are pronounced the same.

The Xylonite Company was producing nitrated cellulose for molded products under processes developed first by Alexander Parkes, then Daniel Spill. The American Zylonite Co. was formed by Dr. Emil Kipper, a German chemist and L. L. Brown, a successful paper manufacturer who had in the late 1860s manufactured explosive caps for nitroglycerin in North Adams, MA.

The company was formed in 1881 and built a factory between Adams and North Adams, MA at a place ever since known as Zylonite. The operation was managed by Dr. Emil Kipper with George M. Mowbray as technical director. At least a substantial portion of the ownership was by L. L. Brown, the owner of a paper company in Dalton, MA, a competitor to the Crane Co. Mowbray had more than ten years' experience in the nitration of glycerine to form nitroglycerine which was used in the boring of the railroad tunnel through the Hoosac Mountain Range from North Adams to Sherborn Falls, MA.

The American Zylonite Company was very successful and formed three subsidiaries for the production of cellulose nitrate products: Zylonite Comb & Brush Co. 1883; Zylonite Collar and Cuff Co. 1883; and Zylonite Novelty Co. 1884.

By 1885, the company employed nearly 500 employees and was a substantial rival of the Celluloid Co., The Zylonite Co., and subsidiaries who produced hand mirrors, combs, hand brushes, piano keys, billiard balls, jewelry and other novelty items.

The operation of the company and its subsidiaries occupied a site built between the railroad and what now is Massachusetts. Route 8. There was a patent suit by the Celluloid Company claiming that the process which Zylonite was using infringed on Hyatt's patents. The first judicial decision disallowed the case, but on appeal, the judge in the original case reversed himself and awarded a sizable monetary judgement to the Celluloid Co. Apparently, at the same time there was a bank failure which caused some concern to Brown. As a result of the two unfortunate occurrences, the Zylonite Companies were forced out of business. Production ceased at the installation on January 18, 1891. Apparently Celluloid Co. bought the operation from Brown, land, building and equipment for about \$1.3 million. Equipment was moved to the Newark, NJ operation of the Celluloid Co. and some of the pertinent personnel were hired.

What happened to the original factory immediately after this unfortunate event, is not known. However, for the past sixty or more years, the Zylonite factory has passed through a long succession of paper manufacturers. The latest owner is the James River Paper Co.

In 1856 Taconic Lodge was built by William C. Allen of New York City. He died on December 24, 1873. His heirs kept the property until it was sold in 1882 to Henry C. Valentine

In 1882 Henry C. Valentine, a varnish manufacturing tycoon from New York, purchased the Taconic Farm Estate. It was situated on 385 acres on the lake, and included all of the south shore. In 1908 Mr. and Mrs. Warren Salisbury, owner of Kimball Piano & Organ Co. of Chicago, purchased the property.

In 1909 the Salisbury's demolished the Taconic Lodge aka Valentine Lodge and built a new mansion.

In April of 1911, Mr. And Mrs. Salisbury announced the new name of their estate, Tor Court, the "Tor", being an old English word which means a hill overlooking a lake. Tor Court has an Onota Lake frontage of 4200 feet, about 3/5 of a mile. At that time the estate included 10 acres of lawns. There were five greenhouses connected by tunnels, 15 head of cattle, 2,000 chickens, plum, apple, and pear orchards, formal gardens and a profusion of white lilacs. Adjoining it on the North is Burbank Park, a legacy to the town in 1882 from Abraham Burbank. Across the lake was Blythewood Farm.

Mrs. Salisbury died in 1945, and the mansion was never reopened, although the family kept it maintained in perfect condition.

In 1948 Hillcrest Hospital purchased the property.

Until 1971 the mansion was used for patient rooms. When the new addition was opened, the staunch old building became offices and administration building.

In 1981 a full scale clean up of the gazebo was organized.

In 1984 while workmen were grading and landscaping near the restored gazebo the ground gave way to reveal a chamber below and a galley running the whole length of the promenade.

Construction workers speculate that the subterranean chambers were actually foundations to prevent the gazebo from heaving from the frost.

The gazebo, situated on rolling lawns behind the stately house and overlooking the lake, was the scene of many turn of the century social events.

Helen had a childhood surrounded by a huge family and extended circle of friends, in Pennsylvania Dutch country, Pennsburg Pennsylvania, outside Philadelphia. Her parents were Arthur Jay Clark and Grace Markley Clark, and she had one older sister, Grace.

Helen was a star from the first - as a gymnast, singer, actress, pianist, stage performer, and all-around high-spirited cutie pie.

Helen used her local fame to good advantage. She often laughed about the time she answered an essay question on a High School history test with a simple answer, like this: "They went to war, etc. etc. etc." She received full credit for her answer.

Helen's glory years reached their peak during the years in Philadelphia and NYC, when she was a student at the Academy of Vocal Arts, and afterwards when she pursued singing, acting and dancing. Helen received a full scholarship to the Academy, the one recipient chosen from among many competitors - big news back home in Pennsburg. At the Academy, she was trained as a mezzo-soprano opera singer.

Helen sang and performed on radio, with big bands, with the USO, in churches, and in stage performances.

Helen considered herself a city person, and always missed her two cities, New York and Philly. One favorite story involved pranks pulled by Helen and her best friend Sally Moore, who was also opera-trained. They'd board the same subway train via different doors, stand in different sections of the car, burst into harmonic song, then exit via different doors.

Helen met her match in Al Nicholls, whom she met through a mutual friend in Philadelphia. Helen and Al had a beautiful romance and 43 happy years together. Al loved her sense of humor, her talent and high spirits, and Helen loved his smile, laugh, intelligence, and inner strength. Just this year, Clark placed a wedding day photograph of Al looking adoringly at Helen on display in Helen's room. Helen reveled in this reminder that she had truly been loved in this life.

After a couple of years in Philadelphia, Helen and Al moved to Pittsfield for Al to run the family business, Pierce Coal and Oil Company. Helen was the very well-organized and skillful treasurer of the business.

During her first decade and more in Pittsfield, Helen kept active with the arts. She

performed in the Junior League's Children's Theater (Pinnocchio and Rose White were two of her roles) and she was a member of the Town Players. She sang in numerous churches at Sunday services and for weddings and funerals. She continued playing piano.

Over time, Helen pulled back on her artistic creativity to focus on caregiving for her home and family, including her mother Grace Clark and her in-laws Clara and Sam Nicholls, and her two children, Clark and Pam. While she never expressed regret about choosing the roles of wife and mother rather than as performer, she very much missed those earlier years and wished she had been able to better balance her home and creative lives.

Helen and Al enjoyed church activities at Zion's together, including singing in the choir. Like Al, Helen served on many committees and on the church council. She also volunteered in the church office.

Helen's final stage role was as a hilarious Buttercup in the Pirates of Penzance, directed by Charlie Benz at Zion's in the early '70's. Her husband Al played the role of the tender Frederic. Pam was in the chorus, along with Sue Hohl and Sammy Slack, and many other friends were in the cast. It was pure joy.

Helen and Al were each wonderful dancers, a delight to watch on the dance floor. They enjoyed traveling to tropical climes, bringing Clark and Pam along for the fun in early years. Later, Helen and Al spent happy winter months in Florida.

Al's arteriosclerosis landed him in the hospital for surgery almost yearly during his last decade, and then cancer took him quickly and unexpectedly. Helen cared for him during those scary times. After Al passed away on December 21, 1989 - and was buried on his 67th birthday, December 23 - Helen's broken heart never fully recovered. She couldn't believe she had to live so long without her beloved, and often longed for the time when she would join him in heaven.

Helen and Clark enjoyed twice-yearly visits from Pam's family, including Helen's now 20 year-old granddaughter Ella Rae Woodland. Helen adored her "Snicklefritz" who owned Helen's heart. Helen was proud of Ella Rae's intelligence and grace, adored her humor and her loving heart, and marveled at the unbelievable fact that this September Ella Rae will turn 21. Where did the years go? A cherished blanket Ella Rae made for her Gramma covered Helen day and night. All caregivers and visitors knew how much comfort Helen took from that cozy blanket, and from her granddaughter's love.

Helen and her "son-in-love" Robin Woodland were great good friends for 29 years. They ran their own mutual admiration society. Helen always counseled Pam to count her blessings and cherish Robin, this wonderful husband, who was such a devoted father - and brother- and son-in-law, too. On Father's Day a few weeks ago, Helen was deeply appreciative that Robin supported Pam in being here in Pittsfield with her, rather than at home with him.

In her last years, Helen had a loving team of caregivers who enabled her to stay comfortably in her home when the time came that round-the-clock assistance was required. Helen and her caregivers built some very meaningful and joyous friendships. Helen retained her sparkling sense of humor, and enjoyed countless laugh sessions and heart-to-heart talks. She got a big kick out of her "campfire girls" sessions with her smoking friends, and enjoyed a little wine at the end of the day.
